

Fund Objective

The portfolio's primary objective is to provide outperformance of its benchmark over a rolling 3 year period.

Fund Strategy

The investable universe of the portfolio will be property securities, property collective investment schemes, property loan stock, Real Estate equity, fixed interest securities (including, but not limited to, bonds, corporate bonds, inflation linked bonds, convertible bonds, cash deposits and money market instruments), debentures, preference shares, non-equity securities, derivatives, and assets in liquid form. The minimum portfolio exposure to JSE listed property shares, property loan stock and property portfolios will be 33% of the portfolio's market value. The Manager may only include forward currency agreements, interest rate and exchange rate swap transactions for efficient portfolio management purposes.

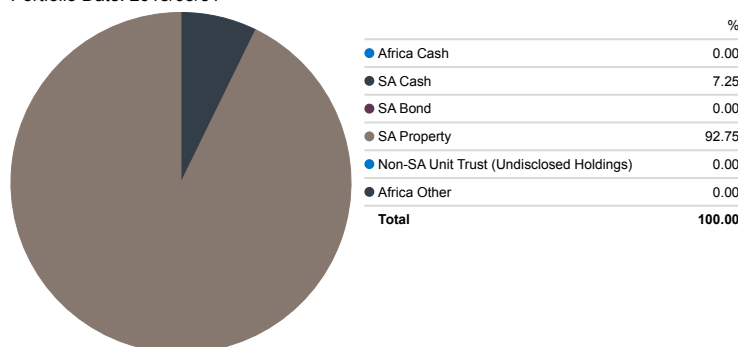

Risk Profile

Aggressive

You can afford to take on a higher level of risk (ie, will have a greater exposure to equities in your portfolio) because of your investment time horizon or your appetite for risk. You know that in taking the risk, you need to be patient if you want to achieve the results. So you are willing to invest for the long-term and are prepared to tolerate some volatility in the short term, in anticipation of the higher returns you expect to receive in five years or beyond.

Glossary Terms

Annualised Returns

Annualised return is the weighted average compound growth rate over the period measured.

Asset Allocation

Asset allocation is the percentage holding in different asset classes (i.e. equities, bonds, property, etc.). It is used to determine the level of diversification in a portfolio.

Capital Volatility

Volatility is a measure of 'risk' and refers to the extent to which the price of an investment or capital value fluctuates over a certain period of time. Funds with high volatility usually offer the potential for higher returns over the longer term than low volatility funds.

Cumulative Returns

Cumulative return is the total growth experienced over the period measured.

Derivatives

Derivatives are instruments generally used as an instrument to protect against risk (capital losses), but can also be used for speculative purposes. Examples are futures, options and swaps.

Distributions

The income that is generated from an investment and given to investors through monthly, quarterly, biannual or annual distribution pay-outs.

Diversification

This is a strategy designed to reduce risk within a portfolio by combining a variety of investments (or asset classes) such as equities, bonds, cash or property, which are unlikely to all move in the same direction at the same time. This is designed to reduce the risk (and protect against capital losses) within a portfolio. Diversification allows for more consistent performance under a wide range of economic conditions as it smoothes out the impact of negative market events. The positive performance of some investments or asset classes should neutralize the negative performance of others.

Financial Instruments

Derivatives also known as financial instruments (such as a future, option, or warrants) whose value derives from and is dependent on the change in value of an underlying asset (such as a commodity, currency, or security) to protect against risk (capital losses).

Fund Objective

The fund objective is the portfolio's core goal.

Fund Strategy

The fund strategy is the way that the fund is managed to achieve the fund objective.

Information Ratio

The Information Ratio measures the market risk-adjusted performance of an investment or portfolio. The greater a portfolio's Information Ratio, the better its risk-adjusted performance has been compared to the market in general.

Collective Investment Schemes

Collective Investment Schemes (CIS) (also called unit trusts) are portfolios of assets such as equities, bonds, cash and listed property, in which investors can buy units. They allow private investors to pool their money together into a single fund, thus spreading their risk across a range of investments, getting the benefit of professional fund management, and reducing their costs.

LISP (Linked Investment Service Provider)

A Linked Investment Service Provider is a financial institution which packages, distributes and administers a broad range of unit trust investments.

Market Capitalization

Market capitalization is the total value of the issued shares of a publicly traded company; it is calculated by multiplying the share price by the number of shares in issue.

Maximum Drawdown

The maximum drawdown measures the highest peak to trough loss experienced by the fund.

Participatory Interests

When you buy a unit trust, your money is pooled with that of many other investors. The total value of the pool of invested money in a unit trust fund is split into equal portions called participatory interests or units. When you invest your money in a unit trust, you buy a portion of the participatory interests in the total unit trust portfolio. Participatory interests are therefore the number of units that you have in a particular unit trust portfolio.

Sharpe Ratio

The Sharpe Ratio measures total risk-adjusted performance of an investment or portfolio. It measures the amount of risk associated with the returns generated by the portfolio and indicates whether a portfolio's returns are due to excessive risk or not. The greater a portfolio's Sharpe ratio, the better its risk-adjusted performance has been (i.e. a higher return with a contained risk profile, where the portfolio manager is not taking excessive risk to achieve those returns).

Standard Deviation

Standard deviation (also called monthly volatility) is a measure of how much returns on an investment change from month to month. It is typically used by investors to gauge the volatility expected of an investment.

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Portfolio Manager Comment

As at 31 March 2018

Economic Market overview

The past few months have been a reminder that markets don't go up in straight lines and, to us, reiterated the importance of having a well-articulated philosophy and process. Unfortunately, it does not remove short term volatility nor does it guarantee a smooth return profile but must serve as a reference point in times when strategy gets tested.

President Jacob Zuma resigned and was replaced by ANC President, Cyril Ramaphosa. Zuma's resignation resulted in significant rand strength. President Ramaphosa moved quickly to remove many ministers implicated in state capture, recalling both Nhlanhla Nene as minister of finance and Pravin Gordhan as minister of public enterprises.

The budget was delivered by Finance Minister Malusi Gigaba and was well received by the market. VAT was increased from 14% to 15%. Both the Budget Speech and Cabinet Reshuffle were well-received by ratings agencies.

Resilient Group came under significant pressure in early January 2018 on the back of market rumours that are tied directly into investor's fears post the Steinhoff debacle in December 2017. As a result of the Steinhoff debacle, investors were understandably skittish of any accounting anomalies and the Resilient Group were quickly moving in the direction of being the "next Steinhoff".

After the initial rumours surfaced, the Resilient Group came out with very clear announcements which should have addressed most investor concerns but it seems this did not deter the continued negative rhetoric in the market. It should be pointed out that the Resilient Group made itself vulnerable primarily due to cross holdings between the group companies and non-consolidation of a BEE structure. This was not new news and had existed for some years.

The European Central Bank ("ECB") will be removing their quantitative easing by the end of this year but they seem to be in no rush to raise interest rates. The Bank of England might raise rates again in May on the back of improving wage growth, low unemployment and the agreed Brexit transition. In the US, the US Federal Reserve, under the leadership of Jerome Powell, revised up their expectations of the pace at which they will increase interest rates in 2019.

The JSE All Share Index ended this quarter negative -5.97%. The All Bond Index generated positive 8.03% returns whereas the property index ended negative -19.16%. The STeFi Composite generated a return of 1.76%

Portfolio Activity

The Ampersand Sanlam Collective Investments Flexible Property Income Fund lost -11.60% for the quarter against the benchmark (33% cash, 67% SA Listed Property) performance of -12.91%. The underperformance of the fund is due to the exposure in the Resilient Group of one of our underlying managers. We have had a significant underweight position in the Group for the past 4 years and we still believe there is value in the underlying property asset.

Position going forward

Our key positions across the portfolios have remained consistent for the majority of the past 12 months.

This rationale has not changed over the past few months and although we have seen a short-term positive adjustment in the sentiment towards South Africa, we remain cautiously positioned as we expect the structural challenges to dampen positive sentiment over the medium term. We have noted recent commentaries related to the difficulties State Owned Enterprises such as Transnet, Eskom and SAA are facing with much interest. While we believe the cabinet change in this area is particularly promising, the work still needs to be done and this work is not easy either technically or politically. This, in combination with the fact that our long term proprietary models on the Rand indicate that the Rand is in the fair value to expensive range, means the need to remain diversified is intact.

We remain concerned with market valuations and risk, however structurally we need to retain growth assets in the portfolio to ensure we achieve our longer term objectives. Asset allocation and diversification therefore remain key to ensuring downside risk management while continuing to achieve our inflation-based returns. Our aim is to provide our investors with diverse exposure across various different investment strategies, investment managers and assets. The result is a vigorous blend of exposures that should have a high probability of achieving our long term return objectives, while providing protection against short term swings and negative surprises, and reducing the overall risk our investors face.

We continue to focus our attention on consistently applying our philosophy and process to ensure we meet our investment objectives over the long term (a time horizon of at least 3 years, and longer for the more risk-orientated portfolios).

We are constantly looking for new information that tests our views and beliefs. We continue to look for better and independent information that we can verify and analyse. When we receive new evidence we will act. For now, we remain patient.

We urge investors to remain patient and committed to their chosen investment strategy as negative surprises are possible. We are continuously looking for ways to increase the certainty of cash flow while remaining cognisant of our longer term capital preservation objectives.
